Before we look at donors

MzN research since 2018

 Based on working with a large number of NGOs and social enterprise since 2011

 Data from consenting, anonymised, past and present clients and analysis based on publicly available data since 2011

Key learning points from our research

- Organisations with around 30% unrestricted income (UR) are four times less likely to fall into financial distress than those that have lower UR rates.
- 2. NGOs that manage to grow
 - a. mature (in value) approx. 15% of their donors every year, and
 - b. add at least two new ones per year.
- 3. NGOs that grow invest substantially into Business Development permanently.




Getting funding right

The myth of donor diversification:
 Many donors are good, the right ones are better!

 Aim for 15%-30% unrestricted funding to be financially stable (MzN research 2020).

 Actively manage large donors and add two new institutional donors per year.

Minimise proposal development costs







Overall Institutional Donor trends

Funding

- 2023 funding was dominated by bilateral funding to the Ukrainian response.
- Top funding themes of 2023 have been:
 - Infrastructure
 - Health
 - Inclusive development
 - Education
 - Agriculture & Rural development
 - Climate Change response
 - Gender issues
 - Localisation
 - Private sector collaboration
- Private sector partnerships and investor involvement are increasing sharply.
- Pure Advocacy work is harder to fund by grants





Major topics in 2024

Funding

- In 2024 we will hear more on the following themes
 - Localization (led by USAID)
 - Private Sector Partnerships
 - Commercial / Service contracts
 - Peace- Development -Humanitarian nexus
 - Non-profit with business grants instruments

 Being reactive to calls/ToRs/donor publications is no longer enough.
 Donors aim for more co-creation.





USAID trends



Record year 2024:

- In Fiscal year 2024, the State
 Department and USAID manage \$63.1
 billion, including \$32 billion for USAID's,
 a 10% increase.
- Recipients mostly Multilateral institutions, contractors and 10 large INGOs.
- But, strategy to work with smaller NGOs is gaining speed.
- Expect a lot more to be pushed to mid-sized and local implementation agencies.

Thematic focus on:

- 1. Private sector partnership
- 2. Localisation takes centre stage
- Improving Global Health and Global Health Security.
- 4. Promotes gender equality, equity and empowerment.
- 5. Assistance to the Ukraine.

USAID Strategy



Get the right funding, not just any!

- 1. Programmatic & geographic long term fit has to be right.
- Things move fast: Build or acquire the capacity to daily monitor, engage thematically and bid fast.
- 3. Core programmes of USAID will likely remain constant, but beware of
 - a. new head of Acquisition and Assistance
 - b. Elections in 2024
- Localisation & Private sector partnership are key success factors

Practical tips:

- Register with
 https://www.workwithusaid.org/ and engage weekly, especially as a local or small organisation
- Monitor large calls & quarterly business forecast and approach key contractors and awardees for subcontracting
- At the right time, prepare a NICRA application process to ensure financial sustainability


- The <u>FCDO</u> has earmarked £6.9 billion for aid in 2022/23, but the increase to £8.3 billion in 2024/25 now

The EU runs more than 30 programmes which provide funding opportunities for EU member states as well as partner countries. It is easy to get lost in the funding opportunities unless you know what you are looking for. While some of these programs are well known and widely recognized - such as Erasmus +, Horizon Europe, EU4 Health, many remain unknown to potential beneficiaries.

EU



Selected EU funds

Horizon Europe is the EU's research and innovation programme for 2021-2027 with a budget of € 95.5 billion.

<u>EU Health Programme</u>, with its budget of €5.3 billion allocated for the period from 2021 to 2027, represents an exceptional level of financial support from the European Union in the field of healthcare.

The <u>Cohesion Fund</u> provides support to Member States with a gross national income (GNI) per capita below 90% EU-27 average to strengthen the economic, social and territorial cohesion of the EU with a total budget of € 392 billion for the period 2021-2027.

Global Europe: Neighbourhood, Development and International Cooperation Instrument - With an overall allocation of €79.5 billion, the new Global Europe will cover the EU cooperation with all third countries, except for the pre-accession beneficiaries and the overseas countries and territories from the geographic programmes

EU Programmes - DG INTPA


As the European Commission's leading agency for international cooperation and development, DG INTPA carries out a number of initiatives that help European Commission and European Union member countries fulfill their commitment toward the attainment of the Sustainable Development Goals, or SDGs.

DG INTPA accounts for a significant portion of total EU aid spending, which is estimated to be worth more than €15 billion annually.

- 33% Infrastructure & Economic Support
- 26% Human Rights, Democracy & Peace
- 23% Budget Support (GOs) & Development/Safety Net
- 18% Climate (esp. Natural Resource Management)



EU on Humanitarian Assistance (ECHO)



Union-funded humanitarian aid actions for 2024 is set at EUR 1.8billion.

NGOs wishing to become partners with DG ECHO and increase their access to programmes funded under DG ECHO are required to complete a comprehensive application procedure. When rewarded with the Certificate of Partnership, it will be valid until December 31, 2027. When a certificate is awarded, then the NGO is eligible to apply for funding and implement humanitarian actions in line with the established rules and procedures.




Germany - Deutsche Gesellschaft für internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) GmbH & BMZ

Key focus areas

The government's coalition treaty (2021-2025) lists the following development priorities:





- The Green Climate Fund (USD 19 Billion, since 2010, largest worldwide, Green Bonds on Infrastructure) GIZ focussed on Water, Biodiversity, and 100's of other project.
- Agriculture and food security, e.g., through BMZ's special initiative 'ONE WORLD No Hunger' with €615 million (US\$701 million), implements since 2022.
- Flight and migration, through the special initiative 'Tackling root causes of displacement, stabilizing host regions, supporting refugees', BMZ allocated €453 million (US\$516 million) for this issue since 2022.
- Climate change and renewable energy, with a pledge of €1.5 billion (US\$1.7 billion) to the Interest Green Climate Fund (2020 to 2023)



AUFTRAGSVOLUMEN IN EURO



Key focus areas 2022 forward:

 2024 Four Global Challenges Approach - Accountability to Affected People, Climate action, Internal displacement, and Statelessness



Budget:

The 2024 budget of \$10.622 billion supports UNHCR and partners in providing life-saving aid to an anticipated 130.8 million displaced and stateless people.

16 outcome areas of UNHCR

- 1. Gender-based violence,
- 2. Education,
- 3. Clean Water and Sanitation,
- 4. Local integration and other local solutions, 5. Resettlement, complementary pathways and family reunification,
- 6. Safety and access to justice
- 7. Sustainable housing and settlements
- 8. Well-being and basic needs Etc.

UN Agencies - UNICEF



Key focus areas 2022 forward:

- In 2022 UNICEF launched its 2022-25 strategic framework, guiding funding and programming for the next 3 years. The focus is on:
 - Transformative Systemic Change addressing the underlying causes of children's mortality, poverty, vulnerability, gender inequality and exclusion.
 - **Recovery Strategy** from the prolonged impacts on children of COVID 19.
- Recent strategic shifts:
- Digitalisation to improve UNICEF programme implementation, streamline operations and processes and enhance outreach in all contexts including remote and digital service delivery and flexible, community-based approaches.
- Climate Change and Urbanisation Understanding the effects of climate change in rural communities and how that impacts children in rapidly urbanizing environments.
